While on duty in the North Atlantic, the Bangor Class minesweeper H.M.C.S. Guysborough was torpedoed and sunk by a German U-boat. Of her crew of 90, five officers and 48 men died from injuries, drowning and exposure during the 19 black hours they clung to carley floats before a rescue frigate arrived.
