May 25th 1944

Dear Son:- Another week gone by and it has been a rather big one for me. Dad & I went to Regina last Thursday and did not get back till Sat. evening. Having left the kids all alone I was rather anxious but they got along fine. We put the truck into the garage as soon as we got there to be fixed and did not get it out till just before we left for home. They had to send to Moe-gaw for repairs so that was the hold up. However I had quite a nice visit and saw two shows while down there. I also met Myrtle's mother she sure is nice. She is hoping Leonard will be home while she is here. Then we saw Uncle Joe's, Lola & Harry and stayed the night with Everett & Eldon and saw Charlotte & Harry everyone was fine. Harrow W. left for Melville Sat. morning Lola is going later. While in Regina we bought a new Chestnut and Chan which arrived here this morning so we have things pretty nice here now just waiting for you to come home and have a comfortable ride down in them.

Had a letter from Len this morning he is going to Cornwallis for some course or other he didn't say what we want see him for a couple of months yet anyway but it is a comfort to know he is off the water at least. Boyd will be disappointed as he is in St. Hyacinthe now. Len thought he was going there too but seems not. Bob Hincks is at Cornwallis now and so is Helen Rose. Boy how I wish you were on this side now too but we will just hope that will be soon now too.

Mr Mac Ledlan had a telegram that Bob is wounded over there but hasn't heard to what extent. Hope it isn't bad. The boys are all through seeding only a little flax. Fulbie has to take Brian down again but I expect they will take the east off now I sure hope it will be all right now. I will let you know how he is when I write next week. Everyone here is fine at present. Donald is still home. The kids didn't get a holiday yesterday but I think they are having it to-morrow. I think Miss Lynnes is staying on for another year but Miss Lynnes is quitting so we will have to look up another nice girl and a good teacher. They had some kind of an oratorical contest up at Liberty last Thursday and Adell brought home first prize in her class she got 7 war saving stamps as she was quite proud she told the story of the three pigs. I think she was the only one from this school that got anything. The others that went from this school were Jean Woolsey, Mildred Ann Kennedy, Daisy Mann, Lois Hincks I think that was all I was sorry we went to Regina that day I would have liked to have gone up.

We got your letter yesterday, the first one of yours to be opened by the censor but it had been. Even if you would like to be moving I was glad to hear you were still on this side.

We had a letter from Leonard yesterday too the first one with his new address on it. He said she is a grand ship of course he couldn't tell us anything about it but the way he wrote he was still in harbour yet. But I suppose by now they will be out. as the letter was dated Feb 5th on my birthday but he had my age wrong he thought I was only 43 but it is 45 and at times I feel like 145. Everyone is fine here at present. We are still having winter yet.

Bill Currie left yesterday for parts unknown he put in for overseas service but I would think he was too old a man for that. But I guess he would like to get over and see his boys. Have you run across any of the boys yet. I haven't heard if their folks have heard from them yet or not since they went down there.

John Tipps arrived home ~~Saturday~~ I think it was he said it was terrible cold up there below 60° and out farther he said it got as low as 71° below how would you

like that without underwear?

I wish you could be here for the big Legion dance to-morrow night. I don't suppose I will be there but I will be sure to cop some of the lucky prizes I always do. I don't think!

Well ~~son~~ I have no news but just thought I would drop you a line and let you know we are still all here.

Leonard must have had his leave but he wrote like he had told us all about it but I suppose that was one of the letters we never got.

Well I will close with loads of love and. May God Bless and keep you safe and smooth sailing wherever you may go.

We haven't heard from Leonard for over a month and I am just a little anxious. But I sure hope we hear from him soon.

Yes I hope god can cushion and everything so he can sure step out now. They were all in yesterday for supper and were all well. They are rather busy now. But it rained today so that will hold them up for a while. The cop's paint very good this year. Hubby has a real good one on Mrs White's but further west it isn't so good but I guess we can drive.

Grandpa is quite the man now he was telling that he had a notion to ride to Vancouver on his bike of course that tickled Grandpa because he lives in Vancouver but I guess he will have to get a better bike yet for that trip.

School starts on Wed. Mr Linnys is coming back and his sister is going to teach the jr room I sure hope she is as good a teacher as he is. Miss Rose joined the W.R.C.N.S. so she will be out of teaching now that was the only way she could get out of teaching as teachers are frozen here now they are so scarce.

I see by the crink paper that Maurice & Evenson is over there now you will have to try and look him up by the way do you get your paper yet? I told Carl to see about it and he said he would so I know he has before now. Yes & Edna we got the wire O.K. and I just can't imagine you not getting my letter as I wrote you both that very day it came.

Grandpa was in Regina over night last week and they said Hazel is down in Nova Scotia Barbara didn't seem to mind much I guess. They were all fine when she was down. He is still here but talking of going back this week. I got all your clothes rounded up for you but have been rather busy canning and haven't got them away yet but will soon. I sure hope you get them O.K. and I hope you have my other one by now. I sure hates anyone else to get what I have packed for my dogs only when they can share them.

Dear Son:-
a whole week late this time. I went down to Regina last week with Hubby expecting to bring Brian home and when we got there they said he would have to be there 2 weeks or 3 weeks longer as they were going to have to operate and put a plate in, they had to go back in on Sat to see about it, so imagine their surprise when they met Mr Maclean and he said "How would you like to take your boy home." They could hardly believe him but they had, had another x-ray taken and a consultation of three Drs and they all decided that nature would straighten the bone by its self so they brought him home Sunday and he is just fine only his leg is in a cast he can't walk yet.

We had a letter from Len to-day that rather has us guessing he did not say in words but so many things he said such as having seen Mac and meeting old pals and hoping to see Boyd soon and such that he is on this side. I sure hope he is we would sure like to see him. I only wish you were with him. We sure were glad he was on the Athabaska on this last disaster she has faced. But there were lots of other poor lads on her that I imagine he knew.

Donald got leave till the 6th of June it will sure help Dad out a lot as the work was getting too much for him, but he is feeling better again. We are having a spell of wet weather just now it snowed like everything this afternoon and is getting quite cold it has been showery ever since Sunday but it was getting pretty dry before the dust was starting to blow pretty bad. The boys had just got started on the land. But the weeds and everything will start now. The grass is nice and green to-day after the rain.

Harlan is over there now, and I guess Bob will be next he went through Regina a week or so ago on his way East. Mrs Barker said she thought Hubert was gone too as she hadn't heard from him for about three weeks. Not many boys left. Boyd is having his first taste of sea life he is on board a ship somewhere we don't know where but it is near Cossywell is somewhere. Harry Wills is through in Regina on Friday then he goes to Yorkton that is where Alice Robertson (Bredge) & Ceyle is now they have a young daughter now. Beverly Grace she was born or Grace's birthday. Lola is going with Harry.

Dad & Gerald are busy changing the bumps out of the middle room into the new kitchen we laid the new linoleum in the two front rooms yesterday. Hubby helped Dad do it.

Dear Eldon:

Back at the struggle again, which could be taken two ways. With the typewriter, and with the duties as Officer of the day. Seems as though it always has to be Woolsey on either Saturday or Sunday. Oh, well, there isn't a great deal to do in the afternoons anyway, but it's kind of nice to be able to get away in the evenings.

I'm off next weekend, luckily, because Mildred is coming up from Moose Jaw on Saturday, she said she was bringing a friend so I'll have to fix them up with another Sub-looey. Guess I shall be spending a few days of my leave down Moose Jaw way. At least I'm having a heck of a lot of fun, although my plans to date include a long period of single life yet. Have been going very steady with the Varsity girl lately, am always invited up for Sunday dinner, and spend at least two or three other nights a week there too. We often play tennis, guess you haven't played for years, have you? Last Sunday was my first attempt since we used to play as kids when we were going to school. All sports have been more or less that way since joining. Last Wednesday the officers challenged the regular Navy baseball team, outside of the one game I played at Craik Sports, it was my first attempt since we left home. I'm hoping to goodness they have equipment at King's for hockey this winter, that still remains the favorite game. About the only game the service leaves time to keep up is Chesterfield Rugby, and even that has its dull moments, such as a twenty day trip to sea, or a remote R.C.A.F. station. Agree?

Heard from Mrs. Dobson today, she asked to be remembered in my next letter to you. I'll be seeing them in about three weeks when training begins. At present I plan on working pretty hard while down there, but there is always something that can avert one's attention. If I could only get another first down there it would sure look good on my papers.

Last week I got a letter from mom, she hadn't heard from me for over a week, and got very worried, thinking maybe I was back in the Hospital or some other crazy thing, she was all ready to phone one night, when, low and behold a letter arrived the next day at noon. I didn't know I had gone so long between letters, will have to watch myself because she even worries when I'm practically next door. I don't write half as many letters as I used to, and don't plan on starting again either, girl friend, or no girl friend.

Charlotte is safely situated in a nice home in Montreal. She and another girl from Winnipeg are working for the C.P.R. I may be able to see her on my way through to Halifax, but am not extra fussy. There are about a hundred Sea Cadets down here training this afternoon. They seem like a funny bunch of little fellows, they will be fighting the next war when we are producing the tools.

Just went up town for a haircut, there are two officers here all the time so we can usually nip away for an hour or so without causing too much commotion. It's better if you have a good fellow on with you, then things seem to run much smoother.

Must say so-long again, as Pete used to say "Be seeing you!"
