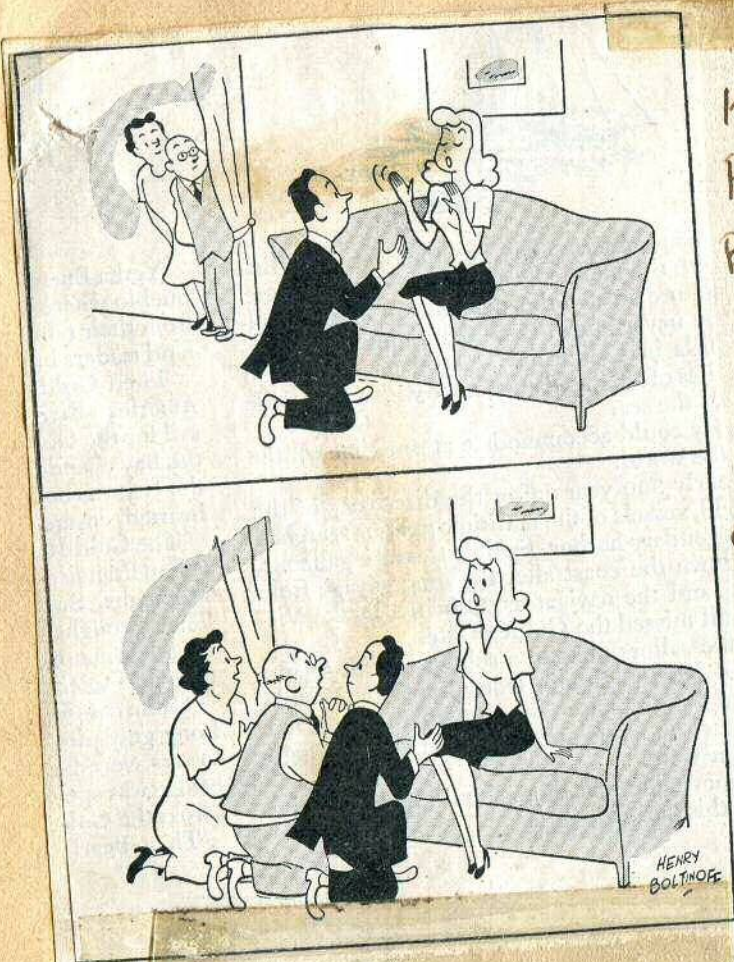

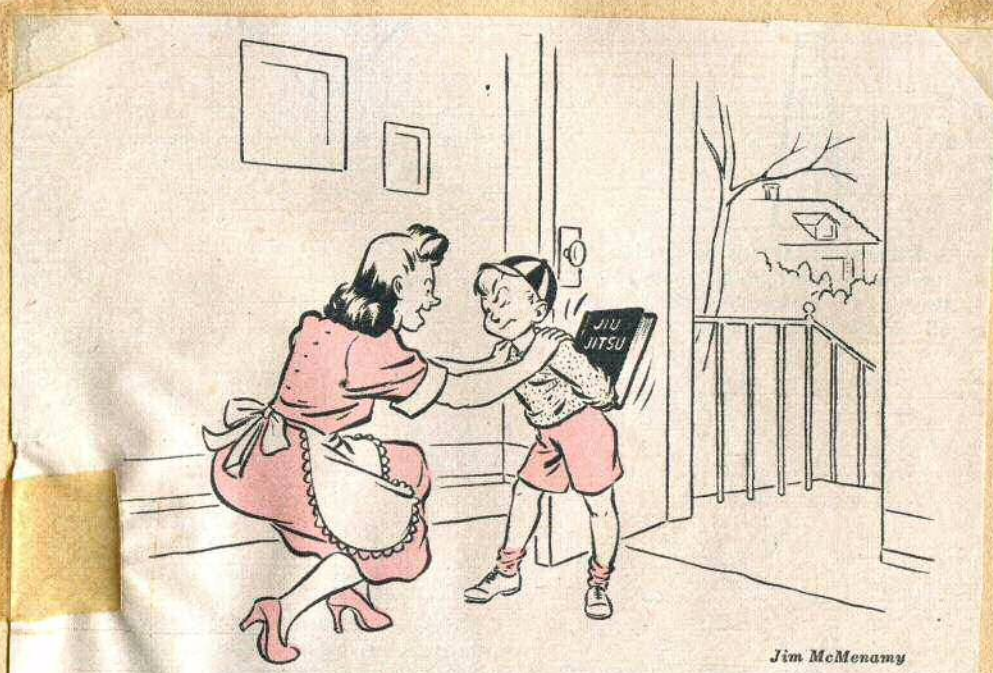

FOR BETTER OR WORSE

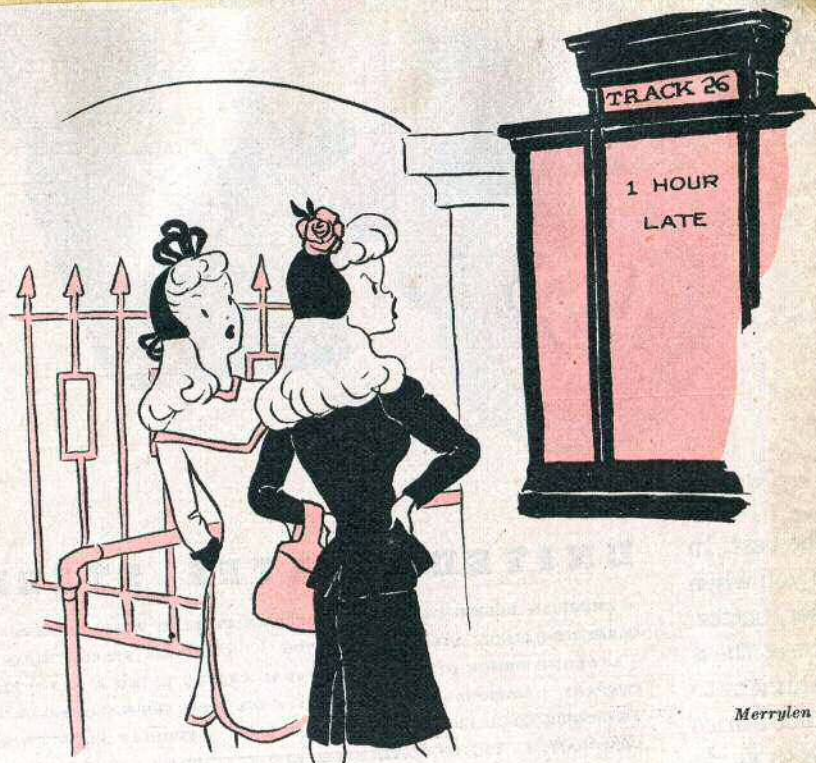

At only 16 he was in United States and rode horseback. At the outbreak of the war he was training at Udonia, and he was killed in action on December 11, 1942, when only nineteen years of age. The American Government has asked for the original manuscript, so it could be kept with other high ranking material in the new Congressional library opened in Washington.

Ottawa, Canada.

You will be required to report for training as a Probationary Wren on....21st. January, 1943......to the Officer-in-Charge, W.R.C.N.S. Training Establishment, Galt, Ontario, subject to a satisfactory medical recheck. The Commanding Officer, R.C.N.V.R. Divisional Headquarters (in Halifax and Victoria, the Commanding Officer, Royal Canadian Naval Barracks), will make all arrangements for your transport and you will be told by him on which day to report for medical recheck and travelling instructions.

2. The daily rate of pay for a Probationary Wren is 90 cents. After the basic training, pay will be increased to 95 cents a day, and then Wrens are entitled to additional proficiency pay in the selected category, in accordance with W.R.C.N.S. regulations.

3. You will probably be required to stay in the Training Depot for one month. Upon completion of your training you must be prepared to proceed direct from the Depot to the Establishment to which you will be drafted.


4. Uniform will be issued as soon as possible. No underclothing is provided, as a grant of \$15.00 is given in lieu. You should, therefore, bring with you serviceable underclothing and enough civilian clothing to last you for one week. The following list is for your guidance:

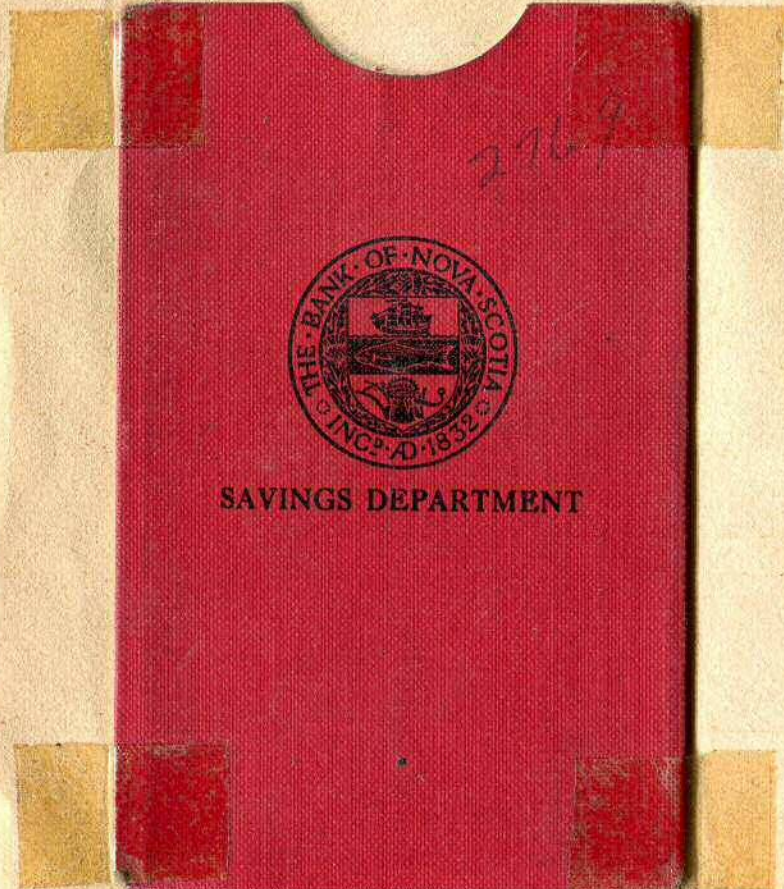
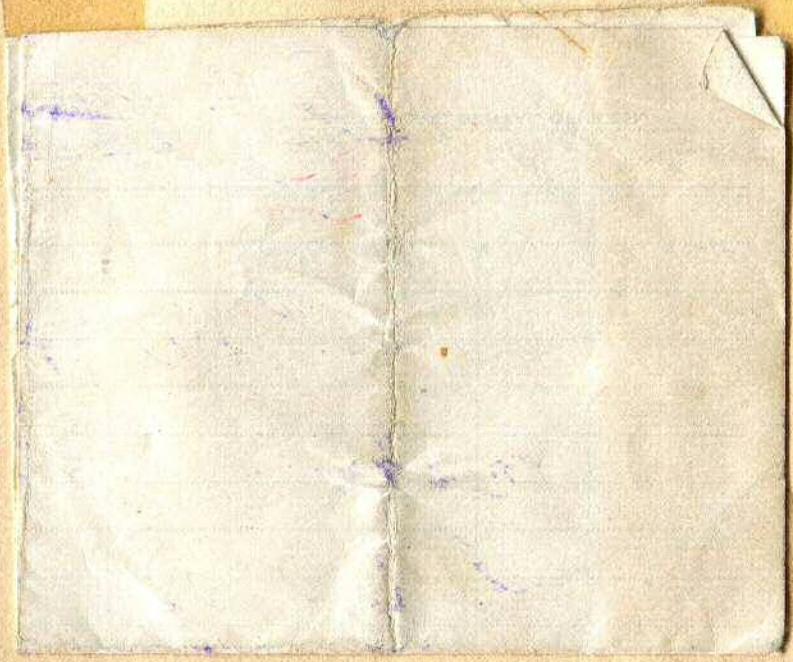
