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

It is with deepest regret that I must confirm the telegram of the 18th February from the Minister of National Defence for Naval Services informing you that your son, Kenneth Harold Dearlove, Signalman, R.C.N., O.N., 4085 is missing and must be presumed lost on Active Service.

Your son was serving in H.M.C.S.
"BPIKENARD" which was torpedoed and sunk by enemy action on the 10th February, 1942. Details of the action are not, however, available at this time.

The possibility of your son having been rescued by other ships cannot be estimated but it has been established that he was not among the survivors landed at a United Kingdom port and very little hope is held out for the survival of the remainder. You will be informed immediately should any further information be received.

I wish to express the sincere sympathy of the Chief of the Naval Staff, Officers and men of the Royal Canadian Navy the high traditions of which your son has helped to maintain.

Dear Sir:

I beg of you to investigate the following information concerning my son, Signalman Kenneth Harold Dearlove, V.4085, "X" Spikenard, who was reported missing lost at sea in February 1942, and later reported "presumed killed".

Since then I have heard all sorts of rumours that my son may be alive, one of the prevalent rumours being that he was an inmate of an asylum in England.

Last week a Miss Leona Best of 1414 Fort Street,
Montreal, a former friend of my son, arrived from
Halifax and came to see me. She told me that my son
was seen in Halifax approximately three monnths ago by
her girl friend, Miss Pauline Murphy of 49 Birmingham
Street, Halifax, N.S.

The following is Miss Murphy's story: My son was supposed to have met Miss Murphy in Halifax, when he approached her saying "Hello Pauline!" Miss Murphy's response was "I'm sorry I don't know you", as he had changed so much. My son said "Oh yes you do, I'm Kenny Dearlove", showing her his papers, identification cards and so forth. His story was that his ship was torpedoed and that he had been lucky enough to climb on a raft. The survivors on the raft were supposed to have been picked up by a ship and set down on an island where they lived on birds and raw fish. Miss Murphy had said my son looked like a skelton and that she would not have known him. Miss Murphy's story then went on that she had asked my son if I knew he was saved, and that he said he was not writing home. "They think I'm dead and I won't let them know I'm alive until after the war because Transferwant they won't know me in this condition". She asked him where he was going and he said "I'm going on another ship".

I wrote to Miss Murphy on November 6th and received a reply on the 11th, copy of which is enclosed.



This news as you can readily understand has been most upsetting to me and my husband, and I should be most grateful if you will investigate this unusual story, thereby putting our minds at rest.

Dear Inspector Drysdale:

- Enclosed herewith will be found a copy of a letter written by Mrs. Margaret Dearlove, 5720 Waverly Street, Montreal, addressed to the Commanding Officer, H.M.C.S. "MONTREAL", Montreal, Quebec, dated November 12th, 1942. Also attached is a copy of a letter addressed to Mrs. Dearlove from one, Pauline Murphy, Halifax.
- It will be noted that this correspondence concerns the loss of Mrs. Dearlove's son, Ordinary Signalman Kenneth Harry Dearlove, R.C.N. This rating was lost through enemy action when the H.M.C.S. "SPIKENARD" was torpedoed and sunk February 10th, 1942.
- As it would appear that some person, purporting to be this deceased rating and provided with necessary identification, has been seen in Halifax, the Commanding Officer, R.C.N. Barracks, Halifax, was asked to make inquiry.
- 4. For your information, the following is an excerpt from the report of the C.O., R.C.N. Barracks, Halifax:

"Miss Pauline Murphy, who has since married and is now Mrs. Pauline Doig, living at 49 Birmingham St., Halifax, N.S., was interviewed with reference to the statements she is supposed to have made as stated in Mrs. Dearlove's letter to the Commanding Officer, H.M.C.S. "MONTREAL". She stated that while she was working in the Cameo Grill, Spring Garden Road, Halifax, N.S. this last summer, a man dressed in Seaman's uniform with one Good Conduct Badge, came into the restaurant and approached her. A short conversation took place during which the rating tried to tell her that he was Kenny DEARLOVE. She stated that he showed her his registration card with that name on it. She further stated that she could not say if it really was DEARLOVE as she had not seen him for some seven or eight months and even then she had not known him very well. He was an occasional customer of the Cameo Grill and in this way she had come to know him. Mrs. Doig also said that although she had written to Mrs. Dearlove and told her this story she had not said anything concerning the torpedoed ship, subsequent rescue and life on an island living on birds and raw fish.

Unfortunately Dearlove was a casualty before having been fingerprinted and photographed by our Personnel Identification Bureau, and we have no photograph of him.

Connection with the above, a list of survivors from it. S.C.S. "Spikenard," together with their photographs, was sold beined through the Sendquerters of this force from the Department of National before (Naval Service), Ottawa, and these photographs were shown to weitresses of the Cameo Rectaurent in Ealifax with a view to possible identification of the person sho represented himself to Pauline MOREY (Nrs. 1818) as the above camed. However, the results proved tegetive and none of the survivors could be so identified. In addition, three of the men listed were interviewed with a view to ascertaining whether or not they might have been responsible. The results in this instance were also negative.

Of the remaining surviving sembers of the orew of the N.M.C.S. "Spikenard," one, O.S. V-85797. Stoker George saderson MORDISON, was killed in an automobile accident in October, 1943. Inquiries are being made in an effort to locate and interview the remainder. An attempt is else being made by the lavestigating member to secure a photograph of the crew of the E.M.C.S. "Spikenard" prior to the sinking with a view to finding out whether or not some former member of this vessel who may have been drafted to another ship before the "Spikenard" was lost may have been responsible for the alleged impersonation.

3. You will be further informed with regard to our inquiries in this matter.

- 1. Mrs. M. DEARLOVE, 5720 Weverly St. Montreel, P.Q., contacted this office requesting our assistance in locating her son, Kenny DEARLOVE, a Signalman in the R.C. Navy, who is reported to be missing since Feb. 10th. 1942. Mrs. DEARLOVE received a telegram from the Dept. of National Defence dated Feb. 18th. 1942, informing hater son Kenny was reported to be missing from the S.S. 'Spikenard' which was torpedoed and sunk by enemy action on Feb. 10th. 1942. On Feb. 19th. 1942 she received a letter from the Dept. of Net. Defence confirming the above telegram, which further stated that her son was not listed amongst several survivors landed at a United Kingdom Port.
- On about Nov. 1st. 1942 Mrs. DEARLOVE received a phone call from Miss Leona BEST, 1414 Fort St. Montreal, informing her that her son Kenny was still alive and was at Halifax, N.S. Wiss BEST had recently arrived from Halifax, and although she did not see Kenny herself, she informed Mrs. DEARLOVE that a girl-friend of hers had spoken to Kenny about two weeks previous to this; being about Oct. 15th. 1942; this girl-friend is a Miss Pauline MURPHY, 49 Birmingham St. Helifax, N.S.
- 5. Mrs. DEARLOVE immediately rote to Miss MURPHY asking her for complete details of what had taken place, and if she could give any information as to the present whereabouts of her son Kenny. An answer was received after a few days, and is a follows:

Dear Mrs. DearLove:

I ree cive your letter this morning. I know how you must feel thinking of Kenny. Now Mrs. Dearlove if he was alive you would be the one that would know, for they would send you word For what Miss Best told you is from Ottowa. quite through (true) about him comeing in and takeing my hand and saying 'How are you Pauline'. I look and said; do I know you, and he said, 'After me haunting this place for the past two years and you don't know Kenny'. So I said, Kenny they sre only one Kenny I know, and that is Kenny Dear-And then he showed his card and it was love. the same name on it. And he asked to take me home and I refuse him, because I could not believe it was Kenny and cannot belive it to this day. harge C. I. B. under date April 21st 1943 is hereby acknowledged. Further to F. C. H. submitted in the above connection no further information is available concerning the person reponsible for representing hisself as Kenny DEARLOVE.

John LAABS. Engineman, VIGISZ have been interviewed but have no knowledge of the affair nor can they give any assistance in this investigation whatsoever. Denis Hugh COMAN able Seaman, V6481 and John Lindley ShiTMORTH, A/L S.V4811 were not in this district at the time of the alleged impersonation. The photographs of these subjects have been viewed by the waitresses in the restaurant but in no way correspond with the description of the alleged impersonator. The eighth survivor, namely George A. MORRISCH, was killed in an automobile accident on October End 1942.

Investigation in this connection has been active since Dec. 2nd 1942 when Mrs. M. DEARLOVE, mother of the above noted received information from a Miss Leona BEST, ex-waitress in the Cameo Grill, Halifax N. S. to the effect that herr son, who had been previously reported missing as a member of the crew of the S. S. "SPIKENARD", had presented himself at the Cameo Grill in Halifax N. S. sometime after the mother had been notified of his death.

who were in the restaurant at the time of the alleged impersonation and all insisted that they did not feel that the rating who presented himself was kenny bashLOVE. With this point established investigation then turned to an endeavour to learn who was responsible for the impersonation. On the presumption that a shipmate of DEARLOVE's was responsible photographs of the survivors of the "SPIKENARD" were obtained and each of the waitresses present in the restaurant at the time were given an opportunity to view the photographs but none were able to identify any of the survivors as being responsible for the impersonation. All available survivors were interviewed but no information obtained of any assistance. One fact has definitely been established and that is the fact that DEARLOVE could not possible be alive. Who committed the impersonation and why such an impersonation should be made could not be learned.

There appears to be no criminal offence committed and investigation in this regard was conducted for the purpose of obtaining some definite information for the mother of DECRLOVE. Every possible effort has be made to reach this objective but no results have been obtained. In view of this it is respectfully requested that this file be closed out
