Dear Mrs. Corkum:

I must regretfully inform you that since your son was reported missing no further information has been received of his servival or that he is a prisoner of war.

I wish to assure you, however, that the Department makes every endeavour to discover the fate of missing men and draws upon all likely sources of information about them.

In the case of men who are believed to be prisoners of war continuous efforts are made to speed up the machinery whereby their names and camp addresses can reach this country. The official means is by lists of names prepared by the enemy government. These lists take some time to compile, especially if there is a long journey from the place of capture to a prisoners of war camp. Consequently "capture cards", filled in by the prisoners themselves soon after capture and sent home to their relatives, are often the first news received in this country that a man is a prisoner of war.

Very slight hope is now held, however, that your son is a prisoner of war as the total number of names of men who are known to be prisoners from H.M.C.S. "ATHABASKAN" coincides with the number which the Germans claim to have captured from this ship.

Even if no news is received that a missing man is a prisoner of war, endeavours to trace him do not cease. Enquiries are pursued, not only among those who were serving with him, but also through diplomatic channels and the International Red Cross Committee at Geneva. The moment reliable news is obtained from any of these sources it is sent to the Department and is immediately passed on to the next of kin.

Should no information be received to the contrary your son will be presumed dead by the Canadian Naval Authorities at a later date.

With reference to your letter of the 21st of November, 1947, no news has ever come to light regarding the fate of the late Gordon Francis Corkum, Able Seaman, Official Number A-1169, Royal Canadian Naval Reserve, who is missing and presumed dead from H.M.C.S. "ATHABASKAN" on the 29th of April, 1944.

Since the time of the tragedy the Canadian Naval Authorities Overseas have been constantly attempting to obtain information regarding naval personnel missing from H.M.C.S. "ATHABASKAN" from various sources, included among which are the diplomatic channels and the Director of Graves Registration and Enquiries, London, S.W. 1, England. Any authentic information which has been received has been forwarded to this Department for transmission to the next-of-kin.

On their arrival back in the United Kingdom the prisoners of war from this ship were closely interrogated in an effort to obtain news. Later, a thorough check was made of the German Casualty Records which were captured practically intact. However, little information was gained from these records. Searcher parties are still operating on the Continent, attempting to locate graves and gain information of the missing men.

At the present time, of the 126 officers and men initially listed as missing, it is known that approximately seventy bodies were recovered shortly after the disaster, and buried along the coast of Finistere, France at Brignogan, Plouescat, Santec and L'Aberwrach. Of the bodies which were recovered, only three were definitely identified.

The War Office, London, expects that the bodies of Canadians will in due course all be disinterred and reburied in proper consecrated Canadian cemeteries on the Continent. It may be possible at that time to definitely identify some of the remains now buried as unidentified by means of dental charts and physical particulars available at present in the Department.

A copy of your letter is being forwarded to the Canadian Naval Authorities Overseas for investigation regarding the possibility of Able Seaman Corkum being an amnesia victim in a hospital in France or England. Little hope is held out in this direction, however, as France was under German occupation at the time and eighty-five prisoners of war were taken on landing ashore in France from H.N.C.S. "ATHABANAME. The possibility of a man landing undetected is extremely remote and due to existing war-time conditions in England at the time the possibility of his returning to England and being placed in a hospital there without a thorough checkback being made as to his identity, would appear highly unlikely.

It is noted that the picture which you state you were enclosing with your letter has not been received.

It would be appreciated if these particulars might be passed on to Mrs. Starrett Corkum.
